Mini Electric Two-Wheel Vehicles

No peddles

Passed vehicle safety certification for electrically powered two-wheel vehicles

Maximum driving speed 25km/h

Vehicle weight: With a battery a maximum of 60kg, without a battery a maximum vehicle weight 40kg




Electrically power assisted cycle (EPAC) has peddles

Passed vehicle safety certification for an electrically power assisted two-wheel vehicle.


Maximum driving speed 25km/h

Vehicle weight: Maximum of 40kg

For maximum safety buy a certified vehicle,



Mini electric two-wheel vehicles are equipped with a range of safety features, including a headlight, tail light, indicator lights, break light and rearview mirror



A certification mark will be affixed to the license plate which must be attached to the rear of the vehicle

Before a mini electric two-wheel vehicle can be driven on a public highway the following is necessary:

1. Insurance

Owners are required to obtain compulsory auto liability insurance from an insurance company for their vehicle




2. Get a license plate

After a vehicle passes a safety test its owner is required to register with the supervisory agency, obtain and affix a license plate



3. Vehicles can only be driven by individuals aged 14 and older

Anyone under the age of 14 cannot drive a mini electric two-wheel vehicle



Uninsured parties are unable to register, change a license plate or receive a license plate

Those found guilty can be fined NT\$1,200-NT\$3,600

Drivers will be fined NT\$600-NT\$1,200, banned from driving and have their vehicles impounded

Any owner of a mini electric two-wheel vehicle who is notified by the competent agency to extend their vehicle insurance within a fixed period of time who fails to do so and continues to drive on the public highways, will have his/her license plate revoked

After the new regulations come into force, owners of mini electric two-wheel vehicles that have passed a safety test and had a certification mark affixed have two years to apply for a license plate. Failure to do so within the fixed time period will result in a fine of NT\$1,200-NT\$3,600 and a ban from driving

Vehicles that have passed a safety test will be impounded Vehicles that have not passed a safety




To ensure safety, drivers of mini electric two-wheel vehicles must observe the rules of the road. The following are strictly forbidden:




Drivers who break this rule will be fined NT\$900-NT\$1,800



Drivers who break this rule will be fined NT\$300-NT\$600



- > Failure to give way to the visually impaired can result in a fine of NT\$600-NT\$1,200
- > Failure to give way to pedestrians can result in a fine of NT\$300-NT\$1,200



The driver responsible will be fined NT\$1,200-NT\$2,400



To ensure safety, drivers of mini electric two-wheel vehicles must observe the rules of the road. The following are strictly forbidden:




Owners of vehicles in violation of this provision will be fined NT\$900-NT\$1,800 and be required to claim a new license plate or make necessary alterations

Driving while under the influence of alcohol, narcotics or refusing to take a breathalyzer test



Drivers who are

- > Under the influence of alcohol (narcotics) will be fined NT\$1,200-NT\$2,400
- > Refusing a breathalyzer test will result in a fine of NT\$4,800, an immediate ban from driving and the vehicle being impounded



Drivers who violate this provision will be fined NT\$300



When a vehicle is found to be in violation of this provision

The owner will be fined NT\$1,800-NT\$5,400 and ordered to return the vehicle to its original specifications

More mini electric two-wheel vehicles related regulations to observe



- 1. Driving without a license plate or with a license plate that is counterfeit or has been modified.
- 2. Lending a license plate to be used on a different vehicle or borrowing a license plate to use on one's own vehicle
- 3. Obtaining a license plate but failing to display it or affixing it to the wrong part of the vehicle
- 4. Driving with a license plate that has been revoked or with no license plate
- 5. When a license plate has been lost and no application is made for a new one or when a complaint is filed and the driver continues to drive without applying for a new license plate
- Failure to drive in the slow lane or to drive on the right side of a lane not designated a slow lane
- 2. Failure to obey regulations on turning corners, overtaking, parking or crossing intersections
- 3. Cutting other drivers off or other forms of dangerous driving
- 4. Failure to turn on lights when driving at night
- 5. Use of handheld cellphone or computer while driving
- 6. Failure to obey the instructions of traffic police or the directions of traffic signs, markings or signals
- 7. Driving in the wrong direction
- 8. Failure to park in accordance with regulations
- 9. Driving on the sidewalk, in the fast lane or cutting across the fast lane
- 10. Failure to give way to a fire truck, ambulance or other emergency services vehicle
- 11. Failure to give way to pedestrians
- 1. When a license plate is lost or damaged and the driver does not apply for a replacement, a new license plate or reapply for a license plate
- 2. When a driver fails to clean a dirty license plate or the plate is covered up and unreadable
